*Award Conditions to the Financial Assistance Award
Between the Denali Commission and The Foraker Group
For Tom Harris Training
Award No. 905-05, Amendment 1
January 2006*

All changes to the award conditions are noted below.

1. *Scope of Work*

This amendment adds no additional funding to the award.

This amendment provides authorization to proceed in funding the United Way of Anchorage as the convener for the first phase of a community plan for services for victims of violence in Anchorage. The following scope was developed consistent with the guidance from a contracting official at the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) in November 2005.

Phase One is authorized to proceed in the amount of \$8,000 which is within the existing scope of the predevelopment pool with the Foraker Group. Upon completion of Phase One, authorization to proceed on Phase Two will be provided by the Denali Commission in an Amendment to this award and will include a revised scope of work.

Phase One

The Foraker Group, working as the Commission's agent, shall oversee the United Way of Anchorage in executing the following Scope of Work:

I. WORK PLAN ELEMENTS

Product – A community plan and logic model that links the work of many service providers to make demonstrable, measurable progress in reducing interpersonal violence in Anchorage.

Process – Develop, with the members of United Way of Anchorage's women's programs groups, with the members of the Anchorage Domestic Violence Caucus, and with The Foraker Group, an integrated community plan that establishes community level and client level outcomes. The steps in the process are:

1. Overview and assessment of community conditions and previous action plans.
2. Set the course by articulating the desired community level results; i.e., what is the quality of life conditions we want for our community and families.
3. Establish and identify the indicators by which we can measure if the desired conditions exist.
4. Establish the baseline to determine whether conditions are getting better or worse and what the trends are if we keep doing what we're doing now. This includes looking at existing assets and services as well as at critical service gaps.
5. Identify the partners with a potential role to play in improving conditions.
6. Identify the interim targets and strategies/best practices for change.
7. Obtain commitment to put selected strategies into action.
8. Analyze infrastructure and facility needs to best accomplish the strategies.
9. Begin implementation and routine evaluation and monitoring.

II. CONSULTANTS

The work will be performed by the United Way of Anchorage:

The United Way of Anchorage (UW) began as The United Good Neighbor Fund in 1956 for the purpose of raising funds for specific health and human service non-profits through a yearly fund-raising campaign. The first campaign raised \$269,000. UW now raises over \$9 million annually that helps support 50 service partners in Anchorage. In addition to its traditional fundraising role, today's United Way of Anchorage promotes strategic initiatives and community coalitions, demonstrating its position as a driving force in the health and human services arena. UW believes that coalescing people and resources around measurable outcomes can create sustainable systemic changes, positively affecting the lives of many more than just those individuals receiving direct services. System change also reduces the risk of feeding rather than solving problems, and promotes services integration and efficiencies. This vision has led United Way of Anchorage to transform its mission and business model from a fundraiser and pass-through allocations entity to an organization that promotes lasting, measurable changes in community conditions that improve lives.

The Foraker Group will oversee the services provided and the selection of the contractors that will perform work outlined in this amendment.

III. LEVEL OF EFFORT – PHASE ONE

- A. Final scope of work, detailed project budget, and specific timelines for key elements of the work shall be achieved by February 10, 2006.
- B. United Way of Anchorage will convene the contractors and meet with groups of service providers and members of the Domestic Violence Caucus to produce the Phase One product.
- C. Phase One's projected date of completion is June, 2006.
- D. Phase I costs are not to exceed \$8,000.

There are no other changes to the original Financial Assistance Award, as amended.
